Burlington Food for Life moves millions of pounds of perishable food each year, and our warehouse in Burlington is where the magic happens. In a normal year, our volunteers contribute more than 50,000 hours; however, the pandemic has made getting involved more challenging for many, and we were confronted with the task of reworking our programs and services to ensure volunteer safety, which remains one of our top priorities. We moved from providing large bulk food shipments, to a pre-bagged model. This program requires many hands to keep the more than 2800 bags each week full of GOOD'ness. The demands on our warehouse team have been ntense and, thanks to the United Way of Halton & Hamilton, we were able to bring a new role on board to support our amazing operations

team. This new team of staff,

Georgetown In partnership with Links2Care, Food for Life opened its first office in Georgetown along with a fresh food fridge and freezer. This is the new home of our Food Rescue Lead who is championing new ways of servina.

We know accessibility is an issue and with this in mind, we have embarked on a new partnership with ActiVan Accessible Transit. This is a specialized transportation service intended for seniors age 65 and older and persons with disabilities residing within Halton Hills. ActiVan helps Food for Life deliver

Hamilton Supported by a threeyear grant from the Ontario Trillium Foundation, Food for Life is actively expanding key partnerships within the Hamilton community. Our expertise in food rescue is helping to drive more GOOD fresh food to allied partners who then provide access to people in need. This work supports our allied partners in the region, and we are proud to help fill the gap through our emerging partnerships with CityHousing St. Matthew's House, The AIDS

Network, Catholic Family Services,

GOOD fresh food bags to those who are isolating or find it challenging to leave their homes.

Open-access drove our continued

partnership with Halton Community Housing and our community fridge and freezer program, stocking three fridges in community spaces at three seniors' residences in Georgetown. These community fridges provide much more than food, as they are hubs for conversation and storytelling among isolated seniors. During COVID-19, volunteers are delivering food right to seniors' doors.

The King's Way Outreach Centre. We also look forward to new and growing partnerships and initiatives, including a mobile produce pilot program in conjunction with CityHousing Hamilton, St. Matthew's House, Wesley Urban Ministries, and Goodwill. The program will provide older adults struggling with financial challenges, food insecurity, and isolation with healthy food options. Food for Life works closely with CityHousing Hamilton to provide food pantries to be accessed by tenants in many buildings. Food for Life's work within the Hamilton Neighbour to Neighbour Centre, and community is critical and timely.

Milton One the fastest growing and dynamic communities in Halton, Milton also has the highest percentage of "working poor." In the wake of COVID-19, we saw an increase in friends and neighbours accessing our community and neighbourhood food

Thanks to funding from the Federal Government and through the Community Foundation of North Halton, we were able to launch our first community kitchen at the Connect

The community kitchen is a busy hub that will allow our talented chefs and volunteers to turn GOOD surplus food into ready-to-eat meals and soup available for our friends and neighbours all over Halton.

Oakville During COVID-19, we have used our allied network to ensure **GOOD** food is safely shared and available to those most at risk. We have used our unique distribution system and partnerships to help the Town of Oakville go beyond providing just food to sharing other items to keep residents active and healthy, including sports equipment for youth and wellness jars for isolated

Food for Life shared more than 900,000 pounds of GOOD food in Oakville this year, helping to meet the

need of thousands of people while we continued to find innovative ways to serve and help, including through partnerships with Halton Community Housing Corporation, the YMCA of Oakville, ArtHouse Halton, Front Line Outreach, and Home Suite Hope.

Sustainability In Action

Sustainability is at the heart of what we do each day. We strive to find solutions to help the planet while ensuring that people have access to GOOD food. Inedible food and soiled unrecyclable cardboard are natural by-products of our food rescue activities. Finding a way to divert this waste from landfills was made possible thanks to the Peter Gilgan Foundation who believed in our dream of returning the

GOOD to the earth. In December 2019 we installed the first on-site composter in Canada at a food rescue organization. Our team of volunteers separates inedible food from its packaging and ensures it goes into the correct waste stream. We are currently working with the Compost Council of Canada and the Investment Readiness Program to turn our compost into a social enterprise.
